

Top curlers battle for their own golden moment at Olympic site

2014 Canadian Direct Insurance BC Men's Curling Championship Feb. 5-9

IT WAS the site of Olympic glory for Canada at the 2010 Vancouver Games.

And now top curlers are back at the Hillcrest Centre to battle for their own golden moment.

The Hillcrest Centre, which is now home to the Vancouver Curling Club (VCC), will host 16 men's teams for the 2014 Canadian Direct Insurance BC Men's Curling Championship, presented by Automation One.

Four final spots were determined in a qualifying event in Salmon Arm (Jan. 10-12) to set the field.

The field represents all corners of the province and includes defending champion Team Bilesky as well as Team Morris, the silver medallists at the Tim Hortons Roar of the Rings Olympic Curling Trials held in December 2013 in Winnipeg.

John Morris, who linked up with Jim Cotter and his team for the 2013-14 season, is looking forward to revisiting the site where he won gold with Team Martin

at the 2010 Olympic Winter Games.

Morris said: "I have some amazing memories from the Hillcrest Centre from back in 2010. Even though the venue has no doubt changed somewhat since the Olympics, I'm sure I'll still get a chill when I walk in there again for the first time since we won gold."

The diverse group of competitors includes past junior, national and provincial champions.

The winner in Vancouver will move on to represent B.C. at the 2014 Tim Hortons Brier in Kamloops in March.

"Curl BC is delighted that the 2014 Canadian Direct Insurance BC Men's Curling Championship will be staged at Vancouver Curling Club this year. We look forward to another exciting event inside this fantastic facility," said Scott Braley, Curl BC CEO.

"The VCC, the beneficiary of the legacy facility from the 2010 Olympic and Paralympic Games, is thrilled to be host-

Van Osch wins first BC Scotties

KESA Van Osch has won her first women's provincial title – and it only took her one try.

The 22-year-old toppled the reigning BC champion Kelly Scott in a nail-biting final at the Prince George Golf and Curling Club.

Things didn't go well for the Nanaimo student in the first end of the 2014 Scotties BC Curling Championship, Presented by Best Western, when Scott opened with a deuce. But the game tightened up after that and Van Osch (and her team of third Stephanie Baier [Victoria], second Jessie Sanderson [Coquitlam] and lead Carley Sandwith [Victoria]) managed to prevent Scott from adding to her lead.

The game was tied 4-4 going into the 10th end with Scott with the hammer.

But Van Osch didn't blink and managed set up perfect final end for her team, protecting her stone in the four-foot, preventing Scott from getting an easy single for the win.

Instead, Scott was faced with the impossible task of trying to draw in behind the Van Osch stone, which was sitting just above the button. Scott's shot was short and the young team got the steal to take the game 5-4.

Kesa is the third Van Osch sister to win a

BC title this year. Her younger sisters Kalia and Marika took the BC junior women's title on December 31 and competed at nationals in Nova Scotia later this month.

The girls had great support from their family, especially their parents Cindy and Ed, throughout the season

"We are incredibly proud of the girls," said Cindy.

Bronze medals were awarded to Team MacInnes, from Abbotsford Curling Club, who played a series of tiebreakers to get to playoffs, and eventually, the semi-finals.

The 2014 Scotties BC Women's Curling Championship, Presented by Best Western, was a huge success.

With two Prince George rinks in the competition, the host club, the Prince George Golf and Curling Club, was full to the rafters all week long. Vonda Hofferd, chair of the host committee, said the event went amazingly well. "Beyond all expectations," she said.

The national Scotties Tournament of Hearts takes place in Montreal February 1-9.

Silver lining for Van Osch, BC's junior women

IT WAS a close game all the way along, but Kelsey Rocque's Alberta team from Edmonton edged out Kalia Van Osch's B.C. team from Nanaimo/Delta in the final at the 2014 M&M Meat Shops Canadian Junior Curling Championships.

Although Alberta never trailed, opening the scoring with a deuce in the third end, B.C. held their own throughout and were able to tie the game in the sixth with a lovely double takeout. Alberta restored its lead immediately with a deuce in the seventh, and B.C. hit back with their own deuce in the eighth.

But in the end Rocque's team were able to blank the ninth to keep the hammer in the 10th and a great hit by the Alberta skip gave them the single they needed to take the game 7-6 and strike gold at Queens Place Emera Centre in Liverpool, Nova Scotia.

Van Osch — whose team was round-ed out by third (and younger sister) Marika Van Osch, second Sarah Daniels,

lead Ashley Sanderson and coach Jim Newlands — were second overall after round-robin play at the competition.

They defeated Nova Scotia's Mary Fay in the semis to earn their spot in the final against Alberta.

With the win Rocque, third Keely Brown, second Taylor McDonald, lead Claire Tully and coach Amanda-Dawn Coderre will wear Canadian colours at the World Junior Curling Championships in Flims, Switzerland.

"So close," said Van Osch. "It was as close as we could make it and she made the last shot for the win, and that's all you ask for as a skip. But it was an amazing experience. The girls performed so well the entire week; they played amazing, and it was just a wonderful time. Nationals is something every junior curler wants to take part in, and we've all had the opportunity to do that this year.

"They'll be a great team at worlds and a great representative for Canada,"

added Van Osch. "We wish them all the best."

Three members of the B.C. team were recognized for their great results throughout the competition.

Third Marika and Second Sarah Daniels were named to the First All-Star Team for having the best percentages in the competition. Marika had 81 percent and Daniels had 80 percent.

Meanwhile Lead Ashley Sanderson was named to the Second All-Star Team for her record of 80 percent.

In junior men's play, Team de Jong overcame a slow start in the competition, winning three in a row to earn a spot in the championship round.

The team from Victoria (third Brook Calibaba, second Ryan Cassidy, lead Alex Horvath and coach Don McMullen) finished the championship with five wins (including an 8-6 win over eventual champions, Team Calvert from Manitoba) and five losses.

Neighbour to head to wheelchair curling nationals

RICHMOND'S Darryl Neighbour is on the hunt for a spot in the national team as he heads to Montreal for the 2014 Canadian Wheelchair Curling Championships.

His team of wheelchair curlers — including veteran third Frank LaBounty (Prince George) and veteran second Vince Miele (Richmond) — as well as lead Alison Duddy (Quesnel) triumphed over Team Austgarden and Team MacDonald on the weekend to win the BC title and the chance to play at nationals.

Neighbour is back playing competitive curling after a year away from the sport due to health concerns. He contracted a blood infection while at

the worlds in Korea in February 2012, putting his curling career on hold.

Neighbour, a gold medallist at the Vancouver 2010 Paralympics, said he was looking forward to playing against the other provinces.

"I'm really looking forward to it — hopefully it will be a way back. I'd like to be on the national team again," he said.

Neighbour will need to be selected

by the Canadian Curling Association in order to get back on the national team. The Canadian team is not the winning team from nationals, but is instead selected from among the competitive wheelchair curlers across the nation. This year the Paralympic team is made up of Neighbour's old teammates from Vancouver, Jim Armstrong, Ina Forrest and Sonja Gaudet, as well as first-time Paralympians Dennis Thiessen and Mark Ideson.

At 65 years old, Neighbour believes he still has a contribution to make to the national team.

"One of the players from the Japanese team was 75 when he played at worlds so I have a ways to go yet. I feel good and I have got over this nightmare," he said.

On Thursday January 23, the team of Scott, Jeanna Schraeder, Sasha Carter and Sarah Wazney released a statement on their Facebook page, saying it had been a difficult decision to disband the team.

Curling fans across the country replied with messages of support for the women.

Scott said she truly appreciated the support. She said: "Sasha and Jeanna were two of the best teammates a girl could ever ask for. It is with heavy hearts that we part ways right now but it's time for us all to dedicate our commitment to other areas of our lives. Curling together has been our world for so many years, this will no doubt take a little adjusting for all of us.

"We truly appreciate the outpouring of support that we have received since our announcement

last week. The curling world is filled with such genuine and wonderful people. We have enjoyed reflecting upon each one of their messages and they have been really touching to us. Thank you!"

The messages of support are echoed by Curl BC.

"Curl BC congratulates Team Scott on their impressive record over the past 10 years and thanks them for representing BC so well both nationally and internationally during that time. We hope to see them back soon," said Curl BC CEO Scott Braley.

The team's Facebook statement said: "Sarah, Sasha, Jeanna and Kelly have dedicated much of their lives to pursuing the sport they love. They are extremely grateful for all the experiences they've had; to have experienced the losses together, as well as the great victories has made them friends for life. The statement continued by thanking their coaches Gerry Richard and Brent Giles, who they said helped make the team the success that it was.

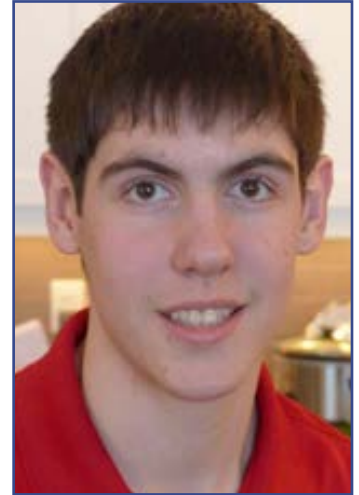

Kedziora and Hannah win Mixed Doubles curling crown

BRYAN Kedziora and Colleen Hannah have won their first BC Mixed Doubles title – and they did it on home ice.

The pair from Golden Ears Winter Club (GEWC) in Maple Ridge lost only once during regular play and blazed through the playoffs, taking a 6-3 win in the quarter-finals, a 12-6 win in the semis and a decisive 8-1 win in the final against Team Miller (Victor and Kerri Miller, Delta Curling Club).

Kedziora, 25, is a two-time BC Junior Men's champion (2007, 2009), while Hannah won a BC junior title in 1988 – the year Kedziora was born. Both have long-standing connections to the Golden Ears club – their families have been members since it first started up.

Hannah, 45, who works in education, said: "We stayed with our game plan, which included sharing the last rock responsibility by changing our line-up every end and kept it up throughout the event. The competition and ice were fantastic and we were excited to win in our home club.

"We would like to thank GEWC for putting on a great event, for all of the volunteers on and off the ice, and to our friends and families for their support."

Fifteen teams representing clubs in Vancouver, Maple Ridge, North Vancouver, Richmond, New Westminster, Delta, Kelowna, Abbotsford, Chilliwack and Prince George took part.

Kedziora and Hannah will now travel to nationals in Ottawa and, if successful there, to the worlds in Dumfries, Scotland.

The event in Maple Ridge held from January 17-19 was only the second BC Mixed Doubles Championship ever held.

The Mixed Doubles game format is becoming more popular and could even become an Olympic event in 2018.

There is one male and one female curler and the game is played over eight ends (instead of the usual 10). Each team has only six stones and one of those stones from each team is prepositioned on the centre line before every end of play. One player delivers the first and last stones of the end while the other player throws the second, third and fourth stones. If they choose to, the two players may swap positions from one end to the next. Both team members are also allowed to sweep.

There are no age restrictions on who can play so participants can be anywhere from juvenile (16 and under) up to masters level (60 plus).

At the national level, a total of 32 teams (one man, one woman) will compete, with the teams divided into four round-robin pools of eight, with the top two from each pool and the next four best round-robin records moving onto the 12-team single-knockout playoff round.

Scholarships available

FOR the second year in a row, the Sandra Schmirler Foundation is offering six \$5,000 scholarships for junior curlers pursuing their competitive curling careers while maintaining their post-secondary studies.

The Scholars will be mentored again this year by world champion curlers Jon Mead and Cathy Overton-Clapham.

Curlers and volunteers good-naturedly pass buckets to fans that enthusiastically reach in their pockets and donate as they pass the buckets. These monies are dedicated to funding the six \$5,000 "Spirit of Sandra" junior scholarships.

The Sandra Schmirler Foundation is indebted to the curling community for its support of its mission to raise funds to purchase equipment for neonatal units in hospitals across Canada, to help save the lives babies.

"We are very grateful to the entire curling community for their on-going support as we continue to partner with the Canadian Curling Association to ensure that Sandra's legacy lives on," said Theresa Breen, Chair of the Sandra Schmirler Foundation.

Team Chmelyk from Fraser Lake and Team Reese-Hansen from Kitimat qualified in Zone 7 (North West).

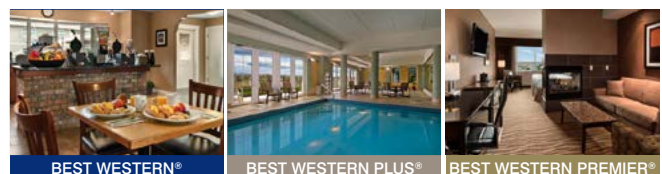

Draw to the button contest yields great results for pair

AT A recent fun night for the Wednesday Night Mixed League in Osoyoos, the league coordinators organized a Hot Shots Competition that included four different shots with curlers scored individually based on the outcome of each shot (similar to Ford Hot Shots).

A Regular Curler is anyone who curls in a regularly scheduled league at an affiliated curling centre, whether the league is organized by the curling centre or by another outside group (commercial

league, rental league, Masters league, etc.). This also includes participants in provincial playdowns who may or may not play in a regularly scheduled league but who are fully paid members, representing your facility at competitions. Curling centres pay affiliation fees to Curl BC based on \$15 (or \$14 if opting out of Personal Accident Insurance coverage) per Regular Curler registered at their centre.

Merritt helps mark 100 years of men's bonspiel

THIS year we celebrated the 100th Anniversary of our Men's League Strickland Cup.

The event took place in early January and featured junior as well as senior curlers and was attended by local dignitaries and covered in the local media.

We had an official opening ceremony that was attended by our Mayor, Susan Roline and a Curl BC representative, Paul Quesnel. The ceremony began with two pipers playing as the 1:00 p.m. curlers filed

out onto the ice. After speeches, Meagan Dunsmore, one of our juniors, threw the first rock at a broom being held by one of our executive members, Rick Olsen, dressed in 19th Century curling attire.

We had 22 teams participate and it was a very fun event with more than a few upsets. For the first time in many years two Merritt teams were in the A Final and B Final. Greg Van Rossum's team came from behind to defeat Grant Angman's team in the A Final and Bob Taylor's last-minute make up team defeated Brent Lindquist's team in the B Final. Bob Arksey's Lower Mainland team defeated Dave Conlin's team in the C Final.

Dinner on Saturday evening was provided by Jerry Sanders and a host of volunteers including many of our ladies' curlers. Our curlers enjoyed a feast of prime rib steak, prawns, baked potatoes and all the trimmings. Well done Jerry!

Our major sponsor this year was Black's Pharmacy and a huge thank you goes out to Curt Thomas for his support. Black's Pharmacy covered our costs for dinner, a beer glass for each curler along with a free beer ticket and jackets for each member of the winning A Final team. Gary Dixon from Boston Pizza provided a large pizza for each team and Brian Snee from Merritt Optometry provided two pairs of sunglasses for a silent auction. Thank you to all.

We had a very good turnout of townspeople taking in the event. Our local newspaper covered the story as did our radio station and Shaw Cable had someone on our ice for over an hour filming the ceremony and our first draw.



A brief history of curling in Merritt

It is believed that the Merritt Curling Centre is the third oldest curling organization in British Columbia.

- The Merritt Curling Club was founded in 1906 by coal miners while curling on natural ice, dependent on the weather. The Middlesborough Coal Mine was booming.
- On November 17th, 1911 Merritt curlers organized and built a curling rink where the civic centre now stands, again with natural ice.
- During 1914 the Strickland Cup was awarded to the mens' champion team. This was donated by A.W. Strickland and presented every year up to this date hence our 100 Year Anniversary.
- 1949 - Men curlers made a motion for women to curl in the afternoon.
- 1951 - Women curlers moved to evening curling two nights per week.
- 1951 - On January 10th, high school boys over the age of 14 curled after school and on Saturday mornings.
- 1958 - Curlers played under the bleachers at the arena, again on natural ice.
- On October 31, 1959 a two sheet curling rink was opened with artificial ice on the rinks present site. This happed along with the start up of the Craigmont Mine.
- October 1972 – The rink was moved into a four sheet facility built by a contractor, many volunteers and local donations of \$25,000 and a \$25,000 bank loan that was paid off in 1975. Sheets 2 and 3 of the existing rink is where the old 2 sheet rink once stood.
- The facility is currently insured for \$1.55 million.
- Further improvements continued in the years following.
- In the mid-to-late 1970's bonspiels included the use of the arena with a 4 event, 48 team men's bonspiel.
- During the men's bonspiel in January 2007 two different teams recorded 8 enders on the same day. Most curlers never experience an 8 ender in their whole curling career
- In 2009 we changed our name to Merritt Curling Centre from Merritt Curling Club.
- Currently we attempt to fill a 32 rink, 3-event men's bonspiel each year.
